This experience will hopefully give this group a better understanding of how the Nebraska State Legislature works.

Also on Thursday representatives from Wayne will be attending the Nebraska State Chamber of Commerce and Industry Annual Meeting and Hall of Fame Banquet. This is a great opportunity to listen to State Senators as well as get one-on-one time to tell them about our wants and needs in Wayne. Participants will leave at 10:30 am and return to Wayne before midnight. We still have a couple of seats available at our reserved table, so let us know if you are interested in attending.

On Monday, February 6 Wayne will be participating with five other Northeast Nebraska Chambers of Commerce (West Point, Fremont, South Sioux City, Columbus and Norfolk) in a Legislative Day in Lincoln. This year we will be gathering for a luncheon at the Cornhusker Hotel in Lincoln. We have spots available here as well but need to know *immediately* if you plan to attend. We will leave Wayne at 9 am from the WAED office. We

hope to return to Wayne before 5 pm. This is another opportunity to discuss with the legislature the common values Northeast Nebraska holds to move business forward.

Finally on March 2, Wayne Area Economic Development and Wayne State College will be hosting the 21st Annual Northeast Nebraska Legislative Forum at the Majestic Theatre in Downtown Wayne. This is a great chance to hear from area senators in our own backyard. There are currently four senators confirmed (Bloomfield, Flood, Sullivan and Adams) and four others invited (Brasch, Janssen, Larson, Schumacher) to attend. What Can Wayne Community Housing Do For You?

Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation (WCHDC) provides many housing-related services in the Wayne area. Our next **Home Buyer's Education** class begins on February 7th and concludes on February 9th. The fee for the class is \$25.00 per household. This class teaches valuable information regarding the home buying process. We are fortunate to have area business people come to class to speak on the real estate sales process, homeowner's insurance, financing, title insurance and loan closings. We appreciate these volunteers and their expertise as they bring valuable information into the classroom setting. An education class is required for many first-time buyer loan programs including our down payment assistance program.

Our HOME Purchase/Rehab/Resale program provides **down payment assistance to income eligible first time homebuyers**. Applications and income limits can be obtained from our office, located in the Chamber building. Pamphlets can be found at all of the real estate offices and many of the local banks. Income eligible first-time buyers can receive a 0% interest down payment loan for up to 20% of the purchase

price of a home that they choose to purchase. You must complete an acceptable education course, and qualify for first mortgage financing as a part of the approval process. An inspection will be completed on the house to determine what health and safety updates need to be made to qualify for the assistance. The purchase price cannot exceed \$120,000.00, and the down payment can be 20% of the purchase price up to a maximum amount of \$20,000.00. The down payment assistance loan will remain at 0% interest, with no payments due, until the first mortgage is paid in full, the borrower moves out of the home (it is no longer their primary residence), or the house is sold at which time payment is due in full. Please do not hesitate to contact Kari Wren at 402-375-5266 for additional details on this program.

WCHDC manages two **Low to Moderate Income eligible rental sites** in Wayne. Meadowview Estates is a 16 unit apartment complex containing 2 and 3 bedroom apartments. Cardinal Estates is a Crown Home project containing 10 rent-to-own homes. Currently, all of these units are occupied. We continue to accept applications for those that are interested in being added onto our waiting list for an available unit. If you have an interest in

either of these rentals, please contact Jessica at 402-375-3660 in the afternoon for additional details.

We are currently working on updating our housing study for the Wayne area with the help of a grant from the Nebraska Investment Finance Authority (NIFA). The last study completed for Wayne was in 2004. The information in the 2004 study is no longer valid to utilize in obtaining grant funds for local projects. The community attitude survey that is currently in circulation is a vital step in the housing study process. If you haven't done so already, please take a few minutes to complete the survey online. There is a link on the City of Wayne's website. If you prefer, you may pick up a paper copy of the survey at the City of Wayne office or the Chamber offices as well. Your opinion is important to us and will be valuable in guiding our leadership toward the areas the community would like more focus on. Housing is a topic that affects many aspects of our City. It is a prevalent part of Wayne's ability to continue to grow and thrive, in attracting new business and retaining our current employers and workforce. A new housing study is a key factor and an integral part in our ability to plan for the future of Wayne.

Innovation-to-Action

On November 11, 2011, a group from Wayne and the surrounding area came together to discuss ways that the community of Wayne could become more innovative. The evening consisted of brainstorming activities and group discussions to draw ideas from the attendees. The topic of "green living" was brought up several times and was a round table discussion topic later in

the evening. The planning committee consisting of Terri Buck, Nick Muir, Lukas Rix and BJ Woehler have met several times since the event, and are looking at an *Innovation-to-Action* series to carry the ideas generated during the Wayne Innovation Night forward. The next event will be held on Saturday, March 3rd with time and location to be determined. The

Up and Down Main Street

These are exciting times around Wayne and on Main Street with a number of building projects underway and/or nearing completion, from the Cobblestone Hotel on the east to Bomgaars on the west. Progress in Wayne? You bet there is!

On Main Street we have seen new businesses like The Clothes RAC, Royal Nails II, and the still unnamed pet grooming business.

With all this activity we still have a former jewelry store and a gift store that need tenants. We really need some retail stores to fill those vacancies and to bring some life and traffic to downtown. It is sad that we have to go out of town to buy men's clothing and shoes and I am sure that when we go out of town to buy these items, we will be buying much more. This contributes to the high leakage problem that Wayne has and which also makes setting up a business in Wayne less attractive. A real "Catch 22!"

The new Downtown Building Design Committee met Monday, January 23 for the first time. It was an interesting meeting where all the members shared their thoughts and there were many. The committee has a major undertaking and will be meeting every second Monday in the City Council Chambers at noon. It is a major task to help preserve, restore, and grow downtown.

Is this committee necessary? I think it is!! We can not let our

downtown waste away and lose our historic buildings. We need to capitalize on these buildings and their restoration to make our downtown historic business district viable and strong so we do not become a ghost town like many small towns that dot the landscape of Nebraska. All of us have an obligation to provide the committee members input and encouragement. They will need your support to be creative and will need to find funding sources to improve the ambiance of our historic buildings and to fulfill the ideas they develop so that these can be brought to fruition and so that the community can capitalize and grow economically.

One bill under consideration, LB888, provides a Historic Preservation Tax Credit for Nebraska. As a community who is fortunate to also have a National Register Commercial District, Wayne would get a triple bonus of incentives if this were to pass. That means every contributing building in our National Register Historic Commercial District would be eligible for the 20% Federal Income Tax Credit for Historic Preservation, the state tax credit if it passes, and the Valuation Incentive Program (VIP). If this appeals to you, contact not only our state Senator, but the Senators who sit on the Revenue Committee.

The Revitalize Wayne/Main Street Committee meets every se-

cond and fourth Tuesday of the month at 8 am in the South Meeting Room of the City Auditorium. In the last meeting we selected new chairs and members of our four subcommittees which follow the Heritage Nebraska Main Street guidelines. We can use new members and volunteers and you are welcome to join us and find out what we do.

In other business this month we talked recycling containers for downtown, the vinyl window signs that are showing up on many business windows sponsored by Matt Ley and the State National Bank. We also got a small sample of the Historic Business Tour being developed on the various Wayne Theaters throughout our city's history. Did you know that the first theater built in Wayne was built on Fifth and Main Streets in 1890 and was called the Opera House? And if you go to that corner could you tell where that historic two story wood building was located? Would it help if you knew the building was torn down in 1930 to build a gas station with storage tanks? See me for the answer.



The Help Wanted sign still hangs at City Hall. We had several applicants for the dispatcher position, and conducted the testing for that position just last weekend. We also have had several applicants for the open Police Officer position. Soon the Civil Service Commission will be asking for applications for the position of Police Chief. With more people coming to Wayne seeking jobs and career advancement we have the opportunity to try to recruit some new families and neighbors. With recruitment efforts to bring new families to town there is no doubt that housing will be a very popular topic for 2012.

Another opportunity we will be facing in 2012 comes from our successes in 2011, industrial sites. Last year at this time we had a large lot with an opportunity building, as well as another 10-acre lot, ready for industrial development. Today, the opportunity building has a new owner ready to move in this summer, the 10-acre lot has been split in half, with another business ready to break ground. That leaves

LB 1114, a piece of legislation being introduced by Senator Mike Flood of Norfolk, eliminates the State Equalization Fund money that the City of Wayne receives from the State. The effect will be a \$300,000 shortfall to our general fund, and in a city the size of Wayne that hurts. I would encourage everyone who owns a business or property in the City of Wayne to write Senators Flood and Bloomfield to tell them this is a bad idea.

And finally I would like to congratulate all of the winners from this years Chamber Banquet, and thank everyone involved in making the event such a success!


